WHY IS MISSION SO DIVERSE? *From the British Director*

Dear friends

Clothes shops sell a wide variety of choices for a good reason. Firstly, people don't come in just one size. Secondly, they like different styles. Simply put, one size doesn't fit all.

Ministry in Europe faces the same issue. Europeans come in all ages, from vastly different cultures, speaking multiple languages, have a selection of religious backgrounds and face varied problems. Need I go on?

And Jesus loves every one of these people. That's why He has called us to find ways to share His love with everyone, however diverse they might appear.

What makes sense to a university student in Albania may not connect with a homeless person in Spain. What appeals to someone out clubbing in Austria probably won't work for a Tamil refugee in Germany. We cannot simply "cookie cutter" ministry programmes from one place to another and expect them to work.

We see this in Paul's ministry in 1 Corinthians 9:22:

"To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some."

This issue of *ECM Outreach* looks at a selection of the ministries ECM workers are

using to share Christ. You may be surprised at how unusual some of them are. Look out for references to cooking, art, music... even an Elvis impersonator!

But behind all that our workers do lie the prayers of people like you. Even the best ministry idea will fail unless God touches people's hearts. Thank YOU for helping make all that we do possible.

EUROPE IN FOCUS

A glimpse of God at work across Europe today



Iranians baptised

Blessed is the one who takes refuge in Him (Psalm 34.8b)

Rita and Vidas Rimkai, who work with immigrants in Gloucester, write, "It was a spectacular Sunday when three Iranian men stood in front of the church and shared their stories. God made Himself known to them in such a unique and unbelievable way. Two of the Iranian men got to know God back in Iran. The

church prayed for one of them for two years before he came to our house group.

"Their courage and joy shone through and through. We live in a country where religion is not considered a crime, where we have freedom, but these men had to run for their lives because of their faith. These men are hungry for God. They attend nearly every house group available at church and are being disciplined by our church's pastor."

Croatian church planting movement

Stephen Bell has been central to the Lausanne church planting movement coming to Croatia, as he explains:

"It has been a joy to see national church leaders and developing younger leaders from all of Croatia's denominations and independent groups coming together to reach their nation for Christ. We have already held two national consultations and some six regional conferences. I am encouraged to see so much willingness to work together.

"In June an overseeing board was set up and plans are being made to hold training for pastors and church members in key areas of ministry. This will begin with training 20 'first generation' Croatian trainers who will pass on their skills to some 150 'second generation' workers. Then on a national level we also will facilitate training in mentoring, church planting and revitalising struggling churches."



Three short months!

Kent and Angie Morton in Albania tell us how a college student moved from anti-church to attending a Bible study in 3 months!

"Albanian college student Gerta (not her real name) was excited about coming to English class, but when she saw that it was at a church, she hesitated and didn't even want to come inside. Fortunately, she decided to come in with one of her friends who goes to our church.

"For the next three months we invested relationally into this college student: letting her see who we are and how we treat each other; letting her experience the love of Christ in us. After three short months she began attending a Bible study on a Friday night. Praise the Lord!

"There is still much that she does not understand, but she knows two things. First, she is welcome to come. Second, we will not judge her. We welcome her questions and doubts. And in return, she receives answers and love.

"This is precisely why we put energy into "non-churchy" events. It is to build relationships in a non-threatening environment."



NewsBite

National award: The World Café in Gloucester, featured in a previous issue of *ECM Outreach*, was shortlisted for Premier's Love Britain + Ireland Award for Community Building. The World Café describes itself as "basically built around a community meal, cooked by people who have often recently arrived in the city and want to engage locally, learn about the culture and people and mostly feel free just to be themselves & share their own special richness." Rita and Vidas Rimkai help organise this migrant loving ministry.

On national TV: "Our church had the opportunity to broadcast a service on a national TV programme. We were asked to give testimonies why the resurrection of Jesus Christ matters and what it has to do with our lives 2000 years later." – Sebastian and Gloria Forjan, Slovenia



Exotic outreach: Klaus and Franz Libuda exhibited at an *Esoteric and Natural Healing Day* in Rostock, Germany. "We had many really good and deep conversations not only with visitors of the fair but also with other exhibitors and we handed out lots of literature and CDs. Klaus was able to hold a short seminar each day about *How to get in personal contact with God*. On one day only a single person attended, but at the end she said that must have been planned by God and by that very evening she was saved!"



Missionary focus

BUSY BUT FRUITFUL

What do missionaries actually do?

Gary and Ioana Stoll have been working with a local church in Piatra Neamt, Romania, since 2014. Their ministry focuses primarily on children and young people but that still leaves plenty of scope for variety, as these quotes from their updates illustrate:

"We are thankful to God for four young people from Piatra Neamt who have put their trust in Jesus and were baptised on Sunday. Praise God that the Saturday youth group which has been running for a year now is bearing fruit."

"Thanks so much for all your prayers for our summer youth camp which happened last week at Voronet. Around 70 young people attended from different parts of the country for a week packed full of activities, good food, games, Bible study, songs, evening meetings and more."

"Please pray as we prepare to take a group of 20 young people and children from Bodești to Brasov for a week away."



"Please pray for the Medical Mission which will take place in various locations including Piatra Neamt, Bodești and Barguani. Last time it was estimated that 1,000 people heard about Jesus through this medical mission, whilst many others experienced Jesus' love through receiving free treatment and care."

Their typical week:



- **Monday:** Bible teaching and training session at their home with 8 young people.
- **Tuesday:** A day off!
- **Wednesday:** Prayer meetings with the youth leadership team in the morning. Housegroup in the evening.
- **Thursday:** Prepare and finish off talks, sermons and activities for the weekend.
- **Friday:** Kids' club in the village of Bodești in the afternoon, followed by a church service
- **Saturday:** Kids' club with a small group of kids in the village of Barguani. Run another kids' club in the afternoon in Roman or Piatra Neamt. Youth meeting in the evening.
- **Sunday:** Sunday School at 9am and then church both morning and evening. Gary preaches once a month.

REFUGE FOR THE REFUGEE

Changing migrants' lives, one at a time



Europe is in the grip of a desperate refugee crisis, but God's love is being shared powerfully nonetheless. Here are three glimpses inside the world of migrant ministry. Due to the sensitivity of their situations some details have been omitted.

‘Every time I read God’s word I cry’

These are the words of W, a young Iraqi man who gave His life to Jesus this morning. I first met him at the start of the year at the school where I teach a couple of hours per week. We had a friendly chat on the train on the way home.

Then, last week, we bumped into each other in town. I asked him how he was doing. He answered ‘not good’ as he showed me the scars on his wrist where he had cut himself. I gave him my number and told him to get in touch when he wanted to talk. I got a phone call from him yesterday evening to ask to meet up this morning.

I didn’t know what to expect. I was ready to just show Christ’s love in the best possible way I

could. It wasn’t long into our conversation that he told me he wanted to become a Christian. For some reason he couldn’t get through on the number on the business card I had given him, but the card also had the church website on it, which he visited. He said that he read and listened to everything on the church website and started reading the “book of the Christians”. He said he loved Jesus and that each time he thought about Jesus on the cross he would start to cry. He said that he also cried each time he read God’s word. ‘Is this allowed?’ he asked.

We prayed together on a park bench thanking God for his salvation through Jesus the Messiah!

From Sri Lanka to Germany to Christ

Another migrant to Europe is 'N', known to ECM workers Vimal and Louise Vimalasekaran, who minister among refugees and migrants in Germany.

"My name is N. I came with my wife R from Sri Lanka to Germany as a refugee several years ago. My expectation was that I would have a good life. However, I was addicted to alcohol and smoking. When I arrived in our refugee camp, my desire was to drink more "good stuff". I came from a religious background, but I did not know the true God.

"I believed that as long as I did good things, God would be pleased and forgive my sins. I did not realise that Jesus came to save me. I did not believe that he could save me from my sins. I thought that I was born a Catholic and therefore I was a Christian.

"A pastor visited us continually in the camp and took us to a church. It was a new experience for me and my wife. We began to study the Bible seriously and the pastor helped us to know more about the word of God and the Lord Jesus Christ. As my wife and I searched the word of God, the Holy Spirit showed us that we are sinners and only Christ can wash away our sins. We thanked God for His mercies and obeyed His word and committed our lives to the Almighty God. A year later my wife and



I were baptised by our pastor in the German Church we attended!

"For nine years we have waited to hear whether we can remain in Germany. We were ready to obey the Lord and if Germany did not give us asylum status, we would have been happy to follow the way the Lord gave us. However, our gracious Father moved mountains to grant us asylum status.

"It has not been easy to live without knowing what will happen to us. It is the Lord Jesus Christ who has been our refuge in our need. In him we found a place of comfort and security. Therefore we were able to continue our lives amid the uncertainties and chaos."

Dried limes, Iranian ‘flamenco’ and the gospel

ECM's Irish Director Charlie Anderson describes a visit to a German refugee centre.

"It was the turn of the Iranian community to do the cooking at the International Café in Karlsruhe. I had the privilege of being part of one of the initiatives led by Vimal (see previous section) at the Evangelical Migration Centre. What a challenging, flavourful taste of Iranian culture and music the night turned out to be.

"The Centre is a collaborative project supported by a group of churches in Karlsruhe which provides a space for workshops, language classes, Bible studies and other community contact initiatives like the International Café. That evening a small team of Iranian believers cooked up a traditional Iranian meal – beef stew containing lots of onions and flavoured with the distinctive taste of dried limes, it was served on a bed of rice with yoghurt dressing.

"As the meal was prepared an Iranian man played his guitar singing Christian songs which although traditional in style, sounded like a Middle-Eastern version of flamenco to me. There was certainly an attraction to clap your hands or stamp your feet but it brought a very emotive reaction from the people present as they obviously experienced a tugging at the heart strings, a longing for home and familiar ways.

"This was not an overtly evangelistic event but somehow sitting there sharing fellowship, eating together, the positive conversations, the building of relationships, the respect of culture and identity, certainly had something of the aroma of Christ about it all. It reminded me of how we also need to build bridges with our neighbours especially those of a different cultural identity from ourselves, so as to be able to share the gospel message."

Praying for refugees in Europe

What we hear about the “refugee crisis” on the news can seem overwhelming at times. But however big it appears, our God is much greater. When we face even the largest challenge we can take it to Him in prayer, knowing He cares and answers.

- Pray that the Lord will open the eyes and hearts of many refugees so that they come to know Jesus and experience His love, healing and peace.
 - Pray that the conflicts in the Middle East and Africa which have contributed to the refugee crisis will soon come to an end.
 - Pray that churches across Europe will know how best to respond to the refugees coming to their areas. Pray that they will respond with compassion instead of fear. Pray that they will initiate many creative new ministries to meet the needs of their new neighbours.
 - Pray for Germany, Sweden, Greece and the other countries that have received massive numbers of refugees. Pray that their leaders
- will know how to encourage their citizens to welcome, not reject, the many needy people crossing their borders.
- Pray for Europe as a whole as it continues to struggle with the unprecedented number of refugees coming to it today.
 - Pray for God to call people with the right gifts into specialised ministry focused on refugees. Pray that they will be able to inspire other Christians to assist in appropriate outreach and social care programmes.
 - Pray for ourselves and our churches to know what the Lord would have us to do in response to this complex situation.

A glimpse inside a summer camp



Last year many of you responded to an appeal raising funds for summer outreach events. Here's what took place at one such camp in Croatia thanks to your generosity.

"Our summer camp entitled "A new season for new things!" took place for six days on the island of Ugljan. 72 people enjoyed the varied activities that started with exercises early in the morning and finished with fun programmes in the evening.

"Each day included time to hear the gospel, worship the Lord with cheerful songs, pray together and share thoughts about our relationship with God. People also learned new skills at workshops, made friends, shared their gifts and talents, played sports and, of course, enjoyed the beach and the sun!

"The camp was a very new experience for me. I met people to whom it was easy to open my soul. Going to the beach was not just a holiday for the body, but also for the heart and the soul." **Katarina**

"Most of the young people attending the camp are in foster care and do not have much self-confidence. But we could share love with them! They were impressed to see that there are people who believe in them and are ready to help.

"After the camp we are having weekly meetings with the campers and we already started discipleship with some of them. Summers camps here are our greatest opportunity to share the living gospel and make new contact with people.

Food

"James has started volunteering one morning a week at a café run by evangelical Christians. Set up a year ago by a member of the Chinese Church, it provides free breakfast for about 40 low-income and homeless people every day."
